2022 was a difficult year for the Whitewater Valley Community. The truth of the matter is that there will always be a need for the services our Program Partners provide and I'm proud that the United Way of Whitewater Valley is here to support their work. Convening resources, supporting matching grants, and providing an easy way for people to maximize the impact of their donation is just a small part of our work that allowed us to help so many people over this last year.

2022 highlights include:

- Supporting two Cause Campaigns a utility assistance fund and a food insecurity fund
 that included donations and grants for people who need help. Thank you to Natco
 Credit Union for stepping up and providing the matching funds.
- During the school year, we helped bring Challenge Day in partnership with Reid Health
 to local 8th-grade students. Challenge Day activities are designed to improve
 self-management, social awareness, self-awareness, relationship skills, and responsible
 decision making.
- We also funded a pilot program to cultivate workforce readiness skills for teens. This is
 in collaboration with the Boys & Girls Club, Future Achievers, and Hogg Helps. Cohort 1
 begins in 2023 and graduates will gain exposure to careers, experience internships, and
 leave with a resume so that they feel prepared to step into the local workforce.

Although our work is far from over, we're headed into 2023 with optimism. We need your help to make this year successful. We could not do this without volunteers, contributors, program partners, corporate partners, our local government, and donors. WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

If students are not reading well by third grade, it begins a downward spiral in academic performance that is incredibly difficult to overcome. Literacy skills build a strong foundation for critical thinking and problem solving. Statistics show that students reading below grade level are far more likely to drop out of school and be on track to become our nation's lowest-income, least-skilled citizens. We know that approximately 30% of Richmond students do not pass the third-grade ISTEP+ Language Arts (Reading) - the first in a series of statewide ISTEP+ tests." Reading skills are lagging even more due to COVID-19.

WHAT WE'RE DOING ABOUT IT

We're proud to support our Program Partner, The Reading Academy. The Academy is designed to focus on students' individual needs and help them overcome reading difficulties to catch them up to grade level. Two weeks of full-day classes over the summer led by highly trained teachers led to 92% of students improving their reading skills - with 50% passing their IREAD test. United Way of Whitewater Valley's funding for The Reading Academy supports their endeavor to develop reading skills, build confident kids, and set them up for success over the rest of their lives.

WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

Kids who have a sense of connection to their communities and each other see an improvement in social behaviors, conduct problems, and academic performance. No one wants to feel like they're alone.

WHAT WE'RE DOING ABOUT IT

United Way of Whitewater Valley once again partnered with Reid Health to bring Challenge Day to 866 students and 178 adults. This means over 1,000 people experienced activities centered on growing their self-management, social awareness, self-awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making.

IMPACT STORY

After participating in Challenge Day, we saw a positive change in local students. The majority reported feeling less alone. 69% reported feeling empowered to make positive change at their school, within the community, and in the world. We also saw 62% of students acknowledge that there were others at the school who understood their feelings and experiences. 63% of students left the program feeling better connected to peers and adults at the school.

WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

Food insecurity and the lack of access to affordable, nutritious food are associated with increased risk for many chronic health conditions, as well as linked to poor academic performance, and other factors that determine a person's likelihood of success.

WHAT WE'RE DOING ABOUT IT

United Way of Whitewater Valley supports Gateway Hunger Relief in order to bridge the gap between paying bills and spiraling into complete financial instability. By supporting their Food Insecurity Campaign, local community members can access food when they need it most. We were able to raise \$10,769 to support this endeavor across Wayne and Union Counties.

WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

A disproportionate number of Wayne County community members have experienced generational poverty. Over time, various data illustrate the challenges residents experience in Wayne County. The median household income in Richmond is \$40,871.00 versus \$47,756 in the County and \$58,235.00 in the state. This indicates families are living below the standards of their peers, but it also reflects pockets of extreme poverty in the county. Richmond's poverty rate is 22.1%, nearly double the state of Indiana. Poverty rates are known indicators that many families and children will experience a lack of opportunity and access as households must prioritize basic needs. Only 19.8% of Wayne County residents have a bachelor's degree or higher educational credentials compared to 27.2% in Indiana. Data from the Indiana Department of Education shows that Wayne County students lag behind their peers in Math and English Language Arts proficiency in the state's 2022 I-Learn data. The consequences of these ongoing socioeconomic challenges are further amplified for people of color who have experienced a high degree of historical bias in Wayne County. Creating positive change for youth requires building opportunities through collaborative community initiatives that seek to address the disparities that are present in Wayne County.

WHAT WE'RE DOING ABOUT IT

United Way of Whitewater Valley is proud to announce support of a new local initiative to promote workforce readiness for teens. Through the collaboration of the Boys & Girls Club of Wayne County, Future Achievers, and Hogg Helps, this 8-week program will provide teens with job skills training and on-site work experience. The program begins in Spring of 2023 and will serve 20-25 teens. A second will follow in the Fall. The program intends to create connections between teens and local businesses to foster future careers. We are looking forward to the impact this makes on our community.

FINANCIAL REPORT

We distributed \$221,482.97 in annual grants throughout Union and Wayne Counties in 2022 – funds that were raised from our Annual Campaign. This supported 29 programs with 24 of our nonprofit partners. Due to an increased need in our region, we additionally raised \$5,897 for Utility Assistance and \$10,569 for Food Insecurity relief.

Here's the thing: **charitable giving is down**. It's down across the country and here in our community, too. The data that's available suggests a couple of reasons, but we're not going to make assumptions. What we can assert is that the need has never been greater in recent history, and we need your help. The decline in donations over 2022 caused us to reach into our reserves - which means we are starting 2023 further behind the starting line.

Normally, a portion of the funds we raise goes to cover our operating costs. This ensures that we can continue to

- Identify the needs of the community
- Determine the root cause of these needs
- Facilitate collaboration between organizations
- Fund the organizations addressing the needs of community.

In addition to this work, we examine our local charitable organizations to ensure their impact, outcomes, and effectiveness are genuine and best-suited to address our local needs. We also help businesses achieve their corporate social responsibility objectives by providing an easy way for employers to give back to their community in a trusted format that leverages the collective impact from all their employee donors. The ability to give is multiplied as each donation is combined with others. The \$5 you give is combined with the \$5 all the other donors gave to achieve more than what one person can do alone.

We made the unprecedented decision to fully fund our own operating costs through our reserve funds because we wanted every cent of the \$221,482.97 to go to our nonprofit partners and the vital programs they provide. This means that even though there was a decline in donations, we made sure none of our program partners felt the squeeze.

United Way shouldered that burden.

Now we need your help to prevent this from happening again and to do even more good work in Whitewater Valley.
